



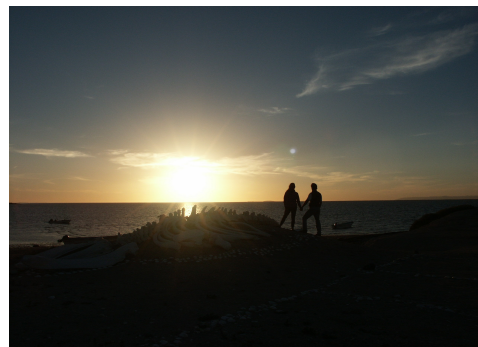
Laguna San Ignacio

The location of our solar installation, where we will put the panels we make to use, is known as Laguna San Ignacio. Situated approximately 70 miles to the north of San Juanico in the core of [Mexico's largest biosphere reserve](#). Laguna San Ignacio is best known as the birthplace of "friendly-whale" behavior and is arguably the best place in the world to observe and interact with whales up close and personal. [A United Nations World Heritage Site](#), Laguna San Ignacio encompasses a variety of diverse environments, including mangrove estuaries, coastal dunes, and other-worldly salt flats.



Beginning in late-December, gray whales begin to arrive in Laguna San Ignacio, after one of the longest animal migrations on the planet, which begins in the arctic waters of the Bering and Chukchi Seas. Pregnant females give birth in the relatively shallow and protected waters of the lagoon, where they raise their calves until they are strong enough to begin the arduous journey back to the arctic in late-April and May. Other adult whales and juveniles engage in a variety of social interactions during the months of January to April, often displaying behaviors such as courtship, breaching, and spy hopping within close view of the small whale-watching boats.

If you're lucky, you may even be able to touch, pet, or even kiss a whale!
